

<u>Creative Nonfiction</u> is open for submissions. They are looking for pieces for their Twitter series as well as longer works. Be sure to read the guidelines.

Our friends at <u>Blue Moose Books</u> are accepting for submissions that respond to their seaside theme. This is a paid opportunity to be published in their anthology. Edited by Jenn Ashworth, you could be published along with writers like Carys Bray, Kirsty Logan, and Pete Kalu (all former guests of the salon).

There are quite a few calls for writing. Our favorite resource is <u>Paul McVeigh's</u> blog. A former guest at North West Literary Salon, Paul is an enthusiastic sharer of information. If you haven't already signed up to his blog, we highly recommend it.

<u>Aerogramme Writers Studio</u> is another source of information, from calls to retreats, they cover opportunities for writers in all stages.

Like to hear good stories? So do we. Check out <u>The MacGuffin</u>. The MacGuffin is Comma Press' initiative and is a platform where anyone can record and share their creativity.

In search of a live lit night? Again, so are we. Manchester's <u>Bad Language</u> is a free, lively evening of prose and poetry. This monthly night has headliners and open mic slots. Whether you want to listen or read, they have space for you at this monthly event.

In or near Lancaster? <u>Spotlight</u> is another monthly night. Featuring musicians, comedians, storytellers and poets, this event tends to have something for everyone. It's around £3 entry. They have headliners, paid mic slots (by invitation), and open mic slots.
